Dear Sir:

I am applying to you for a job in connection with your broadcasting and television programs and I offer to you my time and services as follows:

1. For the year 1950 beginning January 1 and ending December 31, wages at the rate of \$100.00 per week to be paid either weekly or in semi-monthly installments as you may prefer. It is understood that if my services prove to be unsatisfactory then and in that case, you have the right to terminate the contract upon two weeks written notice at any time during the year of 1950.
2. You have the right to exercise the option on my time and services for 1951 for a salary of \$6,000.00 to be paid in semi-monthly installments beginning January 15, 1951, such option to be exercisable by written notice on or before November 1, 1950.
3. You have the right to exercise the option on my time and services for 1952 for a salary of \$7,500.00 to be paid in semi-monthly installments beginning January 15, 1952, such option to be exercisable by written notice on or before November 1, 1951.

It is understood^d you have the right to assign this contract to any other party or parties' in toto or in part, for ex-

ample, as a broadcasting or telecasting station, or sponsors, at any time during the total period of this contract.

It is further understood that during the so called off-season, i.e., the period subsequent to spring training or preceding the regular season of the Brooklyn Baseball Club, my time and services will be subject to employment other than broadcasting and telecasting as you may direct.

I understand that Mr. Walter Barber and Mr. Connie Desmond are presently employed in the broadcasting and telecasting field for your club and it is entirely satisfactory to me to be subject to directional assignment by either or both of these gentlemen during the term of my contract or indeed, to directional assignment by any other employee of yours as you may direct.

If this proposition is satisfactory to you, please note your acceptance on this page and this letter together with your acceptance will form and constitute a contract between us.
